CHAMPIONSHIP & "SEASON ENDING" MEETS

As we emerge from the very quick summer long course season, it is important to reflect on the various championship meets we compete as a team and to look ahead to future seasons:

WMSL"A" & "B" MEETS

In addition to being a member team of USA Swimming, we are also members of the local league (Ottawa, Kent, & Muskegon Counties) known as "WMSL" or the "West Michigan Swim League." These meets are free and are our club conference level meet for all athletes. There are typically two "A" Meet sites & one for the "B" Meet. We encourage 100% team participation, as these are one of our best chances to get as many athletes into relays as. They occur in mid February and mid July.

STATE MEETS

These are the "LSC" or "Local Swim Committee" Championship Meets, which in Michigan, are divided into what has become known as "MAGS" or "Michigan Age Group State" Championships and "ULTRAS" or the "Senior State" Championships. These meets happen at the end of both the Long Course Season (April-August) and the Short Course Season (September-March). Michigan Swimming (our LSC) sets these qualifying times based on the overall strength of our LSC. These meets take place in mid March and late July.

SECTIONAL LEVEL MEETS

Above the LSC level, USA Swimming divides the country into four Zones (Eastern, Central, Southern, & Western). Each Zone organizes the 60 LSCs nationwide several three "Sections" composed of between four and six LSCs - Michigan has typically been in "Section 3" with several of our surrounding states. This is a very high level meet that bridges the gap between LSCs and the national level meets (Junior Nationals, USA Open, Olympic Trials, etc...). These meets occur in late March and mid July.

In addition, there are a few meets that we only race in once per year:

REGIONALS

This level of meet only takes place in early March at the end of the Short Course (SCY) Season. To race in an event in this meet requires that an athlete be faster than the National Age Group Motivational "B" times, but slower than the MAGS or ULTRAS time for their age group. State qualified athletes should still attend to swim any races that they do not have a state cut in.

JAWS STATE GAMES

One of our neighboring teams took it upon itself to run a "Regional" level meet at Jenison each summer. This meet, which takes place in late July, has been a great addition to our calendar for our athletes to finish out the Long Course (LCM) Season with one more opportunity to race main events at the end of the year that they do not yet have state cuts in.

THE ZONE MEET

One additional "Icing on the Cake" meet is the Central States Zone Championships, which always takes place on the last weekend of July. This is an "All-Star" meet, where athletes compete as a "Team Michigan" and represent our LSC. They are required to achieve National Age Group Motivational "AAA" times in order to qualify.

IMX CHALLENGE SUPERSTARS

This season, our team created the "Pink Cap Challenge" as a means to encourage athletes to pursue racing all of the events on the IMX Lineup. So far, the following athletes have completed all the events and earned their Pink Cap:

GR AQUATICS AT THE U.S. PARALYMPIC TRIALS

From Jun. 27th to June 29th, the national spot- Championships (Chile), and now at the U.S. Para-Indianapolis to the U.S. Paralympic Team Trials in both regular USA Swimming competitions and Minneapolis. Among the competitors from around the country was Grand Rapids Aquatics' very own Piper Sadowski, who competed in the S14 category.

Piper raced in the 100 Back, 200 Free, 100 Fly, & 200 I.M. at the meet. She represented Grand Rapids Aquatics in style, winning all four races among S14 Women. With a hard cap of only 12 Men and 21 Women being eligible to qualify to represent Team USA in Paris this summer, athletes not only had to finish high up in their respective events, their times had to rank high internationally. In her very first appearance at the most competitive international team trials for Para Athletes, Piper was able to finish near the middle of the pack across all the para categories!

Piper first got involved in Para Swimming in 2023. In addition to various mid season para meets, she has raced in two U.S. Para Nationals Meets (Charlotte & Orlando), two Citi Para World Series Meets (Minneapolis & Indianapolis), a Parapan
